Demographic Profile

The population in Douglas County, Kansas was 120,290 per American Community Survey data for 2015-2019.

The region has a civilian labor force of 71,171 with a participation rate of 71.0%. Of individuals 25 to 64 in Douglas County, Kansas, 50.9% have a bachelor's degree or higher which compares with 33.5% in the nation.

The median household income in Douglas County, Kansas is \$59,435 and the median house value is \$199,400.



Employment Trends

As of 2021Q4, total employment for Douglas County, Kansas was 49,430 (based on a four-quarter moving average). Over the year ending 2021Q4, employment increased 2.2% in the region.




Employment for Douglas County, Kansas

Unemployment Rate

The unemployment rate for Douglas County, Kansas was 1.9% as of April 2022. The regional unemployment rate was lower than the national rate of 3.4%. One year earlier, in April 2021, the unemployment rate in Douglas County, Kansas was 3.1%.



Wage Trends

The average worker in Douglas County, Kansas earned annual wages of \$42,229 as of 2021Q4. Average annual wages per worker increased 3.1% in the region over the preceding four quarters. For comparison purposes, annual average wages were \$65,055 in the nation as of 2021Q4.

Cost of Living Index

The Cost of Living Index estimates the relative price levels for consumer goods and services. When applied to wages and salaries, the result is a measure of relative purchasing power. The cost of living is 6.3% lower in Douglas County, Kansas than the U.S. average.



Industry Snapshot

The largest sector in Douglas County, Kansas is Educational Services, employing 9,222 workers. The next-largest sectors in the region are Retail Trade (5,863 workers) and Accommodation and Food Services (5,848). High location quotients (LQs) indicate sectors in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The sectors with the largest LQs in the region are Educational Services (LQ = 2.32), Accommodation and Food Services (1.48), and Other Services (except Public Administration) (1.44).



Total Workers for Douglas County, Kansas by Industry

Employment data are derived from the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages, provided by the Bureau of Labor Statistics and imputed where necessary. Data are updated through 2021Q3 with preliminary estimates updated to 2021Q4.

Sectors in Douglas County, Kansas with the highest average wages per worker are Utilities (\$104,618), Wholesale Trade (\$80,810), and Finance and Insurance (\$70,797). Regional sectors with the best job growth (or most moderate job losses) over the last 5 years are Manufacturing (+486 jobs), Wholesale Trade (+124), and Construction (+119).

Over the next 1 year, employment in Douglas County, Kansas is projected to expand by 192 jobs. The fastest growing sector in the region is expected to be Arts, Entertainment, and Recreation with a +2.3% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Accommodation and Food Services (+105 jobs), Health Care and Social Assistance (+53), and Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (+43).

Occupation Snapshot

The largest major occupation group in Douglas County, Kansas is Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations, employing 5,794 workers. The next-largest occupation groups in the region are Office and Administrative Support Occupations (5,615 workers) and Educational Instruction and Library Occupations (4,972). High location quotients (LQs) indicate occupation groups in which a region has high concentrations of employment compared to the national average. The major groups with the largest LQs in the region are Educational Instruction and Library Occupations (LQ = 1.83), Arts, Design, Entertainment, Sports, and Media Occupations (1.52), and Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (1.50).

Occupation groups in Douglas County, Kansas with the highest average wages per worker are Management Occupations (\$92,600), Legal Occupations (\$91,700), and Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations (\$79,600). The unemployment rate in the region varied among the major groups from 1.1% among Healthcare Practitioners and Technical Occupations to 6.7% among Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations.

Over the next 1 year, the fastest growing occupation group in Douglas County, Kansas is expected to be Personal Care and Service Occupations with a +1.9% year-over-year rate of growth. The strongest forecast by number of jobs over this period is expected for Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (+99 jobs) and Personal Care and Service Occupations (+30). Over the same period, the highest separation demand (occupation demand due to retirements and workers moving from one occupation to another) is expected in Food Preparation and Serving Related Occupations (1,099 jobs) and Sales and Related Occupations (628).



Industry Clusters

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. The industry cluster in Douglas County, Kansas with the highest relative concentration is Metal & Product Mfg. with a location quotient of 2.30. This cluster employs 826 workers in the region with an average wage of \$45,221. Employment in the Metal & Product Mfg. cluster is projected to contract in the region about 0.1% per year over the next ten years.





Education Levels

Expected growth rates for occupations vary by the education and training required. While all employment in Douglas County, Kansas is projected to grow 0.4% over the next ten years, occupations typically requiring a postgraduate degree are expected to grow 0.4% per year, those requiring a bachelor's degree are forecast to grow 0.7% per year, and occupations typically needing a 2-year degree or certificate are expected to grow 0.6% per year.




Annual Average Projected Job Growth by Trainir Kansas

Gross Domestic Product


Gross Domestic Product (GDP) is the total value of goods and services produced by a region. In 2020, nominal GDP in Douglas County, Kansas contracted 3.0%. This follows growth of 5.2% in 2019. As of 2020, total GDP in Douglas County, Kansas was \$4,792,694,000.

Of the sectors in Douglas County, Kansas, Real Estate and Rental and Leasing contributed the largest portion of GDP in 2020, \$850,395,000 The next-largest contributions came from Educational Services (\$759,638,000); Manufacturing (\$565,709,000); and Professional, Scientific, and Technical Services (\$371,267,000).



What is a location quotient?

A location quotient (LQ) is a measurement of concentration in comparison to the nation. An LQ of 1.00 indicates a region has the same concentration of an industry (or occupation) as the nation. An LQ of 2.00 would mean the region has twice the expected employment compared to the nation and an LQ of 0.50 would mean the region has half the expected employment in comparison to the nation.

What is separation demand?

Separation demand is the number of jobs required due to separations—labor force exits (including retirements) and turnover resulting from workers moving from one occupation into another. Note that separation demand does not include all turnover—it does not include when workers stay in the same occupation but switch employers. The total projected demand for an occupation is the sum of the separation demand and the growth demand (which is the increase or decrease of jobs in an occupation expected due to expansion or contraction of the overall number of jobs in that occupation).

What is a cluster?

A cluster is a geographic concentration of interrelated industries or occupations. If a regional cluster has a location quotient of 1.25 or greater, the region is considered to possess a competitive advantage in that cluster.

What is the difference between industry wages and occupation wages?

Industry wages and occupation wages are estimated via separate data sets, often the time periods being reported do not align, and wages are defined slightly differently in the two systems (for example, certain bonuses are included in the industry wages but not the occupation wages). It is therefore common that estimates of the average industry wages and average occupation wages in a region do not match exactly.

What is NAICS?

The North American Industry Classification System (NAICS) is used to classify business establishments according to the type of economic activity. The NAICS Code comprises six levels, from the "all industry" level to the 6-digit level. The first two digits define the top level category, known as the "sector," which is the level examined in this report.

What is SOC?

The Standard Occupational Classification system (SOC) is used to classify workers into occupational categories. All workers are classified into one of over 804 occupations according to their occupational definition. To facilitate classification, occupations are combined to form 22 major groups, 95 minor groups, and 452 occupation groups. Each occupation group includes detailed occupations requiring similar job duties, skills, education, or experience.
